This prior approval reprogramming action is submitted for approval because this action uses general transfer authority and exceeds established reprogramming thresholds. This reprogramming action provides funding in support of higher priority items, based on unforeseen military requirements, than those for which originally appropriated; and are determined to be necessary in the national interest. They meet all administrative and legal requirements, and none of the items have previously been denied by the Congress.

This reprogramming action transfers \$14.8 million between Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 Army appropriations. This reprogramming action uses \$14.8 million of general transfer authority pursuant to section 8005 of division C of Public Law 115-31, the Department of Defense (DoD) Appropriations Act, 2017; and section 1001 of Public Law 114-328, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2017.

Explanation: Funds are required to fortify missile defense capabilities by completing building renovations required for full mission capability of the Joint Tactical Ground Stations (JTAGS) radar located in Korea. Design scope includes extensive electrical, HVAC, and fire life safety repairs. The JTAGS radars, located in Korea, Europe, and Japan, provide in-theater monitoring and warning of ballistic missile launches. The JTAGS radars tie into local command-and-control networks to ensure a rapid issuance of an alarm should they detect a missile launch and in-bound strike. This is a base budget requirement.

Explanation: Funds are required for the following:

- \$+2.2 million to support the implementation of the Army Space Training Strategy at both home station and the Combat Training Centers (CTCs). This training provides tactical units (brigade level and below) with the skills and tools to successfully operate in a contested space operational environment, typified by denied or degraded access to position/navigation/timing (PNT) and satellite communication (SATCOM) systems. This is a base budget requirement.

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- \$+10.2 million to support Space Surveillance Network/Space Object Identification (SSN/SOI) missions that provide combatant commanders with real-time surveillance of ballistic missile launches as well as the ability to acquire, track, and report on near-earth and deep-space satellites. The SSN/SOI provides commanders with information on foreign space launches, information on space objects, metrics and imagery for satellite protection, and responsive and dynamic space situational awareness. This funding also supports the operation and maintenance of various radar systems on Kwajalein Atoll supporting the SSN/SOI mission. This is a base budget requirement.

Explanation: Funds are available in enlisted pay and allowances in Pay Group F as 2,400 fewer non-prior service Army Reserve Enlistees are able to attend initial entry training than budgeted. The Army Reserve is unable to fill available training seats due to Soldiers in the Delayed Training Program (DTP) opting to join the Active Army over the Army Reserve. Currently, the fill rate for the available 12,000 training seats is 90 percent. This is base budget funding.
