<u>Project Description</u>: This project constructs a standard design Access Control Point (ACP) includes a Visitor Control Center, Gate House, Overwatch Booths, Guard Booths, and the vehicle and truck inspection canopies. The project also includes roadways, parking, lighting, traffic control signals, and passive and active vehicle barriers with comprehensive control systems.

Justification: An additional \$2.9 million is required to award the ACP at full scope. Circumstances associated with the project's site and design delayed the award of this project that resulted in bids exceeding previous projections. As the design for the ACP reached completion, flood plain charts were updated resulting in the original site location being included in a 100-year flood plain boundary. To comply with environmental requirements, the facility was re-sited outside of the floodplain which caused additional design delays and added to the project's complexity. The design team took steps to reduce estimated costs. After these efforts were accomplished, the current bid for the base contract work still exceeds reprogramming authority.

<u>Project Description</u>: This project constructs a standard design barracks that will support 250 soldiers.

Justification: An additional \$17.6 million is required to award this project. During the project's planning and design phase, which occurred in FY 2018, unit prices and low inflation rate assumptions failed to account for the unexpected escalation of construction costs in Texas. Labor and material cost increases attributable to the local economy's recovery from the past winter and the impact of COVID-19 have resulted in an \$11.7 million increase to the project's cost. Additionally, the Privatized Utility Partner has finalized its cost estimate, which is significantly higher than originally projected, based on the details provided in the planned project award documentation. The privatized utility connection fee is contributing \$5.9 million to the overall cost increase of the project.

<u>Project Description</u>: This project constructs of 26 single-family housing units and demolishes 34 pre-existing housing units at USAG Kwajalein Atoll.

<u>Justification</u>: An additional \$8.3 million is required to award the full scope of the project. Despite the actions taken to control costs, when bids opened in May 2020, all competitive offers received were above the project's authorization and appropriation. The additional costs are due to (1) increased project scope (22 housing units to 26), (2) the rising cost of construction on Kwajalein (the Department's index for estimating construction costs increased 25% from FY 2017), (3) installation design guide changes requiring the addition of electrical transformer enclosures, (4) upgrades to the telecommunication systems to meet current network requirements, and (5) an elevated finished floor for the housing units to mitigate for flooding and sea level rise.

On January 20, 2021, the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy, and Environment submitted a "Report on Conditions on Use of Funds for Kwajalein Project per the Fiscal Year 2018 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), Section 2879 (a)(1)(C)" to Congress. Section 2879 (a)(1)(C) required, as conditions on the use of funds, that this project construct 26 family housing units and if the costs exceeded the amount authorized, in addition to meeting the requirements of section 2853 of title 10, the Secretary of the Army was to submit a separate report to the congressional defense committees. The submitted report details the reasons that the project costs exceeded the authorized amount, steps that the Army took to implement cost savings efforts to include alternatives considered, and lessons learned.

The project is required to replace failing housing. The existing units are no longer in a condition to allow renovations or upgrades. This project and the future housing projects at USAG Kwajalein Atoll are a high priority to the Army.

<u>Project Description</u>: This project constructs a high-bay C-5 aircraft maintenance hangar with reinforced concrete foundation and floor slab, masonry exterior walls on the office area and metal sandwich panels on the hangar area, electrically operated hangar doors, structural steel frame, architecturally compatible roof, fire protection and alarm system, utilities, secure and non-secure communications, site improvements, and other necessary support. Additional space shall be provided for shop, tool and administrative functions.

<u>Justification</u>: An additional \$10.3 million is required to award this project. Initial cost estimates at 100% design were consistent with the previous cost estimate. However, bids received in August 2019 exceeded the appropriated total. In an effort to control costs, portions of the project were redesigned to reduce costs and the project was resolicited in September 2020. The current bid of \$52.882 million accounts for construction cost increases due to higher structural steel and material prices, labor shortages, and productivity impacts stemming from COVID-19 preventative measures and an improving local economy.
