- I. <u>Narrative Description</u>: The National War College mission is to prepare future leaders of the Armed Forces, Department of State, other civilian agencies and international students for high-level policy, command, and staff responsibilities, by conducting a senior-level course of study in national security strategy development and national security policy process. A fundamental strength of the College is its joint, interagency, and multinational environment and approach. Students and faculty are drawn from all U.S. armed forces evenly, from U.S. civilian departments and agencies concerned with national security policy, and from a broad coalition of foreign militaries. The College program stresses the interrelationship of domestic, foreign, and defense policies, and the necessity of inclusion and coordination of Service, interagency, and multinational capabilities, perspectives, and other factors in national security strategy planning and national security policy execution.
- II. <u>Description of Operations Financed</u>: Funding provides for academic requirements: books, copyrights, and all those operations associated with the academic program. Maintenance to support operations requires significant funding: this includes facility support in classrooms, seminar rooms, committee rooms and the auditorium. The Regional Studies program, a centerpiece within the curriculum, requires funding for guest lectures, embassy coordination, regional preparation and travel.
