This reprogramming action is submitted in two parts. **Part I** transfers \$6.650 million from Procurement, Marine Corps, 04/06, appropriation to Operation and Maintenance, Marine Corps, 04/04, appropriation. **Part II** transfers \$3.0 million from Research, Development, Test, and Evaluation, Navy, 04/05, appropriation to Procurement, Marine Corps, 04/06, appropriation. This action uses general transfer authority pursuant to section 8005 of Public Law 108-87, the DoD Appropriations Act, 2004; and section 1001 of Public Law 108-136, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2004, and is determined to be necessary in the national interest. The reclassification is required to properly execute funds in accordance with congressional intent. These actions do not change the purposes for which the funds were originally appropriated. These actions meet all administrative and legal requirements of the Congress, and the Congress has not denied any of the items.

Explanation: In FY 2004, Congress appropriated \$6.65 million within the Procurement, Marine Corps, 04/06, appropriation for 6T/NATO Equivalent Absorbed Glass Material (AGM). Funds are required to procure AGM batteries. The batteries will be used in trucks, amphibious assault vehicles, light armored vehicles, generators, and many other items. These batteries provide increased capacity, increased life, and increased recharge efficiency over conventional sealed batteries. In addition, these batteries are classified as non-hazardous materials, which make them safer to ship and store than conventional gel/acid batteries. These items are more appropriately funded in the Operation and Maintenance, Marine Corps appropriation since they are not centrally managed. Therefore, a reclassification reprogramming is necessary to execute these funds in the proper account. This reprogramming does not alter the congressional intent for use of these funds.

Explanation: In FY 2004, Congress appropriated \$3.0 million within the Research, Development, Test, and Evaluation, Navy, 04/05. appropriation for fielding state-of-the-art Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosive defense protection, detection, medical support, decontamination, logistics support and reconnaissance systems to improve the national Chemical Biological Incident Response Force and enhanced Marine Expeditionary Unit missions. To satisfy Congressional intent of "fielding" rather than research, these items are more appropriately funded in the Procurement, Marine Corps, 04/06, appropriation. Therefore, a reclassification reprogramming is necessary to execute these funds in the proper account. This reprogramming does not alter the congressional intent for use of these funds.
