This reprogramming action is submitted for prior approval because it involves a transfer from the Iraq Freedom Fund (IFF) and the transfer will initiate a new start in FY 2004. This reprogramming action transfers \$193.2 million from the IFF to the Other Procurement, Army, 04/06, appropriation for proper execution. The transfer authority is contained in the Emergency Wartime Supplemental Appropriations Act for Defense and for the Reconstruction of Iraq and Afghanistan, Public Law 108-106. It meets all administrative and legal requirements of Congress, and the Congress has not denied any of the items.

Explanation: This item is a new start in FY 2004. These funds are required to provide Ballistic Protection Kits (add-on armor) to Army trucks and other vehicles in order to protect against attacks from small arms, rocket propelled grenades, and Improvised Explosive Devices. Installation teams install kits at user location. These items will be employed directly in Operation Iraqi Freedom to reduce casualties. The FY 2004 baseline amount has not yet been adjusted for undistributed congressional reductions.

<b><u>Budget Activity 2: Communications and Electronics</u></b>	
Lightweight Counter Mortar Radar (LCMR) -	- 38 <b>+25,000</b> 38    25,000

Explanation: This item is a new start in FY 2004. The LCMR detects enemy mortar fire quickly, allowing a response before the enemy changes position. It locates mortar firing positions automatically by tracking the mortar shell and then backtracking to the weapon position. The LCMR provides continuous 360° surveillance identifying mortar locations out to 7 kilometers using an electronically scanned circular array antenna. The LCMR warning message indicates a round is incoming and enables counter-fire.

Rapid Aerostat Initial Deployment (RAID) -	- <b>+38,300</b> 38,300
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Explanation: This item is a new start in FY 2004. The Rapid Aerostat Initial Deployment (RAID) is an elevated sensor that provides electro-optic (EO) and infrared red (IR) cameras to detect enemy activity for force protection. The RAID sensors detect personnel (out to 13 kilometers) and vehicles (out to 22 kilometers). Enemy encroaching friendly bases to fire mortar, grenades or artillery can be detected and unit commanders can respond with the right amount of force at the right time.
