<u>Description</u>: This project constructs a 12 kilometer paved roadway from the Village of Yaqubi in the Khowst Province of Afghanistan to the Border Surveillance Point (BSP) #9 near the Pakistan border, Project Number 67222. This is the main route between the Forward Operating Base (FOB) at Sabri and the BSP. Military patrols travel this road several times on a daily basis. This action provides \$5 million to cover the costs of the original defaulted contract and the replacement contract.

<u>Justification</u>: The Road from Khowst to Border Surveillance Point 9 project was appropriated for \$7.9 million in the Fiscal Year 2007 Emergency Supplemental Act. A contract for the full 12 kilometer (km) scope was awarded on June 25, 2007, but was subsequently terminated for default on October 24, 2009. On December 10, 2009, a replacement contract for 3 km, with options for the remaining 9 km, was awarded to complete the road project. This action provides \$5.0 million to fund the termination costs (\$2.5 million) incurred on the default contract—including supervision and administration, and the options on the remaining replacement contract (\$2.5 million).

The terminated contractor left the road in a condition that is virtually impassable. The road's poor condition causes vehicles to slow down or stop completely in areas of extreme hostility, subjecting patrols to sniper fire, Rocket-Propelled Grenade attacks, and Improvised Explosive Device (IED) explosions. This road is called the most dangerous road in the region. Completion of the roadway will greatly reduce threats to U.S. and Allied personnel, enhance the mission of securing the border with Pakistan, provide

smoother traffic flow at greater speed, and deny insurgents the opportunity to place IEDs in culverts and/or bury IEDs in unpaved sections. Thus, it is necessary for full original contract scope to be replaced.

Our goal is to process this action as quickly as possible. The contractor has completed the work on the base award (3 kms) and is ready to start construction on the next option. If the contractor has to wait several months for the award of the options, he may have to demobilize. The security situation is such that after demobilizing, he may not be able to reestablish his mobilization camp due to threats against the landowner and sub-contractor, and due to the possibility that arrangements with local villages for laborers and security may not be able to be re-secured. Without security on the road, the contractor expects the area to be mined and road conditions to deteriorate.
