This reprogramming action is submitted for prior approval because it uses general transfer authority, exceeds established thresholds, affects congressional special interest items, and initiates a **new start**. This action reprograms funding in support of higher priority items, based on unforeseen military requirements, than those for which originally appropriated; and is determined to be necessary in the national interest. They meet all administrative and legal requirements, and none of the items have previously been denied by the Congress.

This reprogramming action transfers \$67.995 million among various Defense appropriations. This reprogramming action uses \$67.995 million in general transfer authority pursuant to section 8005 of Public Law 111-118, the Department of Defense (DoD) Appropriations Act, 2010; and section 1001 of Public Law 111-84, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year (FY) 2010.

Explanation: Funding is required to support the development of the Competitive High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWV) Recapitalization Program focused on the Up-Armored HMMWV (UAH) portion of the Light Tactical Vehicle fleet. The current UAH is restricted to base camps in Theater because it does not provide required soldier protection levels to combat current threats. These funds will address threats from improvised explosive devices by taking advantage of industry's knowledge and capability to provide for enhanced protection and survivability of U.S. forces, while retaining the automotive performance as tested on the current UAHs during type classification and materiel release procedures. It is the Army's intent to conduct a full and open competition, encouraging partnership between industry and depots, to take advantage of the tremendous expertise developed since September 11, 2001. This is a **new start**.

Explanation: Funds are required to procure 627 High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWV) to replace aging Air Force HMMWVs. Approximately 389 vehicles have exceeded their service life and are not economical to repair. The remaining 238 vehicle authorizations are vacancies in mobility inventory and will meet current and projected future threats including rapid response contingencies (e.g., Haiti). The Air Force is aware of the Army's decision not to buy new HMMWVs because of their survivability in certain hostile environments. The Air Force has concluded that the small number of new HMMWVs requested by the action is required for use in threat environments where they are survivable. The Air Force will use \$55.505 million to procure 285 vehicles, which was approved on the FY 11-10 PA. This request will use \$66.495 million to procure the remaining 342 vehicles.

Explanation: Funding is available because the Army, after a thorough review, has decided that it no longer needs to buy new HMMWVs. The HMMWV has demonstrated that it cannot survive in a battlefield situation that involves improved explosive devices and other lethal threats. As a result, the Army has concluded that it has all the HMMWVs that are required. The Army does plan to recapitalize portions of its existing fleet for use in circumstances where they are survivable, but it does not plan to buy any new vehicles. This is Overseas Contingency Operations (OCO) funding. This is a congressional special interest item.
