This prior approval reprogramming action is submitted for approval because this action uses special transfer authority and exceeds established reprogramming thresholds. This reprogramming action provides funding in support of higher priority items, based on unforeseen military requirements, than those for which originally appropriated; and are determined to be necessary in the national interest. They meet all administrative and legal requirements, and none of the items have previously been denied by the Congress.

This reprogramming action transfers \$600.0 million among Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 Defense appropriations. This reprogramming action uses \$600.0 million of special transfer authority pursuant to section 9002 of Title IX, Overseas Contingency Operations (OCO), of division A of Public Law 115-245, the Department of Defense (DoD) Appropriations Act, 2019.

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Explanation: Funds are required to repair Marine Corps facilities in North Carolina largely at Camp Lejeune, Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Cherry Point, and MCAS New River, which sustained major damage from Hurricane Florence. Nearly 800 repair projects are required at these locations, where catastrophic rain and wind resulted in widespread damage to critical facilities across the installations. These projects address extensive damage to critical infrastructure necessary to maintain operational readiness, to include hangars, maintenance facilities, and living quarters. In nearly all cases, the roofing systems and roofing enclosures for these facilities were compromised during the storm, with subsequent sustained rainfall leading to devastating water damage to building interiors.

The Marine Corps is in the process of completing their damage assessment and will have a completed detailed facilities plan to which the Department will address any funding shortfalls. This is an emergency requirement.

Explanation: Funds are required to repair Air Force facilities at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, which sustained major damage from Hurricane Michael. Nearly 700 facility repair projects are required at this location, where catastrophic rain, wind, and flooding resulted in widespread damage to critical facilities across the installation. To date, 242 facilities have been identified for permanent repair, 235 approved for demolition, and over 200 are still under evaluation. These projects address extensive damage to critical infrastructure necessary to maintain operational readiness, to include hangars, aircraft maintenance facilities, the air traffic control tower, F-22 flight simulators, the air operations center complex, and living quarters. The majority of repairs are focused on roofing replacement, window replacement, mold and asbestos remediation, and debris clearing and removal.

The Air Force is in the process of completing their damage assessment and will have a completed detailed facilities plan to which the Department will address any remaining funding shortfalls. This is an emergency requirement.

Explanation: Funds are available from the Coalition Support Fund due to a lack of claims for reimbursement from key cooperating nations and the United States' continued suspension of nearly all security assistance to Pakistan, with limited exceptions allowed for programs that directly support U.S. national security interests. Even if the suspension is lifted, there is insufficient time to process claims from Pakistan this fiscal year. This is Title IX OCO budget funding.
